In this first article of the New Year I find myself reflecting on the often neglected season of the Church Year, Epiphany; a Greek word meaning 'manifestation' or 'appearance.' This season begins on January 6 with the reading of Matthew's account of the Magi, wise men from the East who came to pay homage to the newly born Messiah; the King of the Jews. Across the centuries the Church has used the beginning of this season to acknowledge the revelation of Christ to all nations. It is the good news proclamation of the Church that Jesus, the Son of God is the Savior of all people and that no one is to be excluded from God's love. In Jesus, God reveals his loving intent for the entire world. During this important season we will ponder how God was revealed through Jesus and consider as well how God continues to reveal himself through Jesus to this very day.

In recent years the month of January has been a time of prayer for Christian unity. In a world so conflicted and confused by the mixed messages of our world and culture, it is becoming increasingly evident that as a Church we must pray for the power of the Holy Spirit to bring us to a place where the Body of Christ works together for the sake of revealing God's loving intent for his creation. Too often the many parts of the Church have worked harder at lifting up what separates us rather than drawing closer to that which unites us.

I often wonder what it is that people, who are not part of the church, see when they look in upon us. Do they see a people who truly love each other and seek to share that love with others? Do they see a people who will go the extra mile for the sake of the poor, the frail and the outcast of the world? Do they see the reflection of Jesus in the way we live and treat others? Or do they see people who are often cantankerous, hurtful and more likely to reject than accept others? Or worse yet perhaps they see nothing more than just another club that goes by the name of church. Now there is nothing wrong with clubs, but there is something very wrong when a church cannot be distinguished from any other social or service organization.

The Church is to be the body of Christ in the world; our actions, as individuals and corporately is to be a manifestation of God in the world. But unfortunately I fear that we get caught up in so many other things that the world sees very little of God in us. In the middle ages a tradition began where Christians would inscribe on the lintel of their doors the New Year and into the middle of the given year they would write the initials C+M+B. The letters stand for the three magi; Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar, names ascribed to the magi sometime during the 7th

century. This blessing would happen on Epiphany and it served as a reminder to people that as they ventured out they were called to reveal Christ to the world and to also be observant to the presence of Christ in others. Perhaps we too need such a reminder for how we are to act as we go out into the world each day. I will end this article with an Epiphany House Blessing and invite you to take the time to bring family, friends and neighbors together to bless each other's

homes. The only other thing you will need is a piece of chalk to inscribe "20 C+M+B 12" on the lintel of your door. May this blessing serve as a gentle reminder that you and all of us together are called to manifest God's love in the world.

Blessing for a Home at Epiphany

INTRODUCTION

Matthew writes that when the magi saw the shining star stop overhead, they were filled with joy. "On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother" (Matt. 2:10-11). In the home, Christ is met in family and friends, in visitors and strangers. In the home, faith is shared, nurtured, and put into action. In the home, Christ is welcome.

Twelfth Night (January 5) or another day during the season of Epiphany offers an occasion for gathering with friends and family members for a blessing of the home, using the following as a model. Someone may lead the greeting and blessing, while another person may read the scripture passage. Following an eastern European tradition, a visual blessing may be inscribed with white chalk above the main door; for example, 20 + CMB + 12. The numbers change with each new year. The legendary names of the magi are Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar; later the initials came to stand for Latin blessing Christe mansionem benedica, which means, "Christ, bless this house."

GREETING

May peace be to this house and to all who enter here. By wisdom a house is built and through understanding it is established; through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures. Proverbs 24:3-4

READING

As we prepare to ask God's blessing on this household, let us listen to the words of scripture.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace." John 1:1-4, 14, 16

INSCRIPTION

This inscription may be made with chalk above the entrance: 20 + C M B + 12 The magi of old, known as C: Caspar, M: Melchior, and B: Balthasar followed the star of God's Son who came to dwell among us 20: two thousand 12: and twelve years ago. +: Christ, bless this house, +: and remain with us throughout the new year.

PRAYER OF BLESSING

O God, you revealed your Son to all people by the shining light of a star. We pray that you bless this home and all who live here with your gracious presence. May your love be our inspiration, your wisdom our guide, your truth our light and your peace our benediction; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Gospel of Mark What will I do with the Good News of Jesus Christ?

The Lutheran Church, along with many other mainline and liturgical churches, utilizes a three year lectionary for the Scripture Readings in our worship services. Both Pastor Kevin and I normally base our sermons on the assigned readings. We were taught and we believe that preaching on assigned texts forces the pastors and listeners to seriously consider the message that is from God rather than to search through the Scriptures looking for passages to make the points that we'd like to make.

So, with the beginning of the new church year in Advent we began what is called, "Year B," or the year of Mark. Because Mark is the shortest of the four Gospels, readings from John also appear throughout the year. Since we will be reading much of the Gospel of Mark in the coming weeks, I wanted to share with you a bit of an oversight of this particular gospel.

The Gospel of Mark was probably the first of the Gospels to be written. Its date of origin was somewhere around 70 AD, either a little before or a little after the temple in Jerusalem was destroyed in the Jewish war with Rome. The writing does much to encourage and comfort Christians facing persecution and suffering. This writing also appears to come from the time of transition between the first and second generations of Christians. The writer sought to give a succinct account of Jesus' ministry, passion, death and resurrection.

You won't find some of your favorite biblical accounts in Mark! There is no Christmas story, no Beatitudes and in the original ending, no post-resurrection appearances beyond Easter morning itself. Unique to Mark is the parable of the seed growing secretly, the healing of the deaf and dumb man, the healing of the blind man of Bethsaida, sayings about salt, and the flight of the young man in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Jesus' death on the cross takes the central place in Mark's Gospel. Everything else must be seen in relationship to this great event. One of the themes in this gospel is what biblical scholars call "the messianic secret." A good example is found in chapter 9, verse 9 where after coming down from the Mount of Transfiguration Jesus tells his disciples to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. The point is that only after Jesus' death and resurrection took place could the disciples then begin to make sense of what they had heard, seen, and experienced.

I believe that the Gospel of Mark has a significant relevance to us today. The writer of Mark was concerned as the faith passed from people who had known Jesus personally to those who would learn about Jesus by their witness, that there was a recording of the activities of Jesus, especially those surrounding his great sacrifice in Jerusalem. In our world today, as fewer and fewer people know the good news of Jesus, it is imperative that we who put our faith and trust in Jesus know the story and share that story with others. Mark is brief and to the point. Our witness to Christ need not be long and involved, but we do need to know about Jesus before we can share with others. We need to know about Jesus if we are to draw on this strength and direction in the midst of our troubles and suffering.

The original ending of this gospel is chapter 16, verse 8 which reads, "So, they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." Later Christians were so bothered by this unusual and seemingly incomplete ending that other endings were written. They appear in brackets in most English Bibles. Check out your Bible to see the added endings! Mark's original ending is realistic and makes you think. Obviously someone began to tell others or the faith would not have been passed on!!! Yet Mark 16:8 asks each of us, "What will you do with the Good News of Jesus Christ?"

I look forward to exploring the pages of the Gospel of Mark with you throughout the coming months! I hope you have a wonderful new year and that 2012 will be a year of growth for all of us as we journey with Christ and with one another.

If you are able to pay the entire fee before the retreat that would be helpful. It also is acceptable to stretch it out into three monthly payments between January and March.

Space is limited to eleven couples plus the pastors, so registration will take place on a first-come, first-serve basis. Once you have registered, you will be sent a letter with directions, schedule details, and a 10 minute assignment to prepare for the retreat.


