And Now, for the Gospel of Mark

During our worship services each year, we read from a particular Gospel. Matthew, Mark, and Luke are known as the "Synoptic Gospels," meaning that they are parallel accounts with overlapping material telling us about the life of Jesus. These gospels have much in common, but it is apparent that each one was written from a particular point of view and with a particular audience in mind. The Gospel of John is often treated separately because its very nature is different. Rather than travel log or event reporting, John is prone to long theological speeches and reflection.

The Lectionary takes us on a three year cycle, using a different Synoptic Gospel each year and then pulling from the Gospel of John for particular Sundays, especially around the time that we remember Jesus' passion. This year, the Readings take us to the Gospel of Mark and in this year we read more than usual from the Gospel of John.

Mark is the shortest of the Gospels. Scholars believe that it is the oldest of the Gospels. Actually, Mark invented the genre of "Gospel," which means "the good news." It is a cry of iov!

I encourage you, on a cold winter day or evening, sit down and read the entire book of Mark at one time (or over a few days as you need to do). Clearly, the writer was a story teller. It is likely that this writing was originally read aloud in one sitting. You will gain new insights when you read this as one book.

The story moves rapidly in Mark. The word "immediately" is used forty-two times (eleven times in Chapter One.) Jesus' first words are "The time is fulfilled!" Mark tells the reader in no uncertain terms that because of Jesus the world will never be the same again.

Mark Allan Powell, a New Testament professor at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio, lists these major themes in his introduction to Mark:

- ❖ A Very Human Portrait of Jesus
- The Centrality of the Cross
- Secrecy
- Proclamation of the Kingdom
- The Failures of the Disciples

For me, one of the most interesting aspects of Mark is the ending. The original manuscripts ended with Chapter 16:8. "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." Apparently, the early church members didn't find this a satisfactory ending. That's not surprising, is it?! In most English Bibles, we find a couple of alternate endings that were added to the original at a later time. I think Mark's ending fits his story well. What do you think?

I hope to see you in worship often in the coming year as we explore many passages from Mark and John. The urgency felt by Mark should be the same urgency we feel today. Jesus speaks to us as surely as he spoke to the people of Galilee long ago. "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

The time is now. Let your faith be fed by studying the word, receiving the sacrament, sharing in the support and consolation of one another and serving God by caring for our neighbors. If not now, when???

Mindfulness ...

The other night on '60 Minutes' Anderson Cooper did a report on the subject of a meditative practice called **Mindfulness**. While the term 'mindfulness' was new to me the topic was very familiar since the subject matter is really about meditation. In part Mr. Cooper talked on one of my favorite subjects of how in the hurriedness of life people often wander rather aimlessly through life making choices without consideration of the long-term consequences. Our minds race in a thousand directions; we are often inattentive to that which is most important at any particular point in our lives. I cheered too when the reporter noted that as a culture we have become addicted to our mobile devices that have added another level of distraction.

I appreciated much of the '60 Minutes' report since it reflected upon the importance of being able to still one's mind and be present to the moment; the simplicity of just being aware of sitting or walking. I am reminded of those YouTube videos of people busy rushing through a shopping mall staring at their smartphones and stumbling into a fountain that they were too distracted to see. The point of Mindfulness is to still the chaos of our minds so we are aware and attentive to the present moment. A top executive for Google begins many of her meetings by having participants practice a few minutes of Mindful meditation; noting that these few minutes helps people focus on the meeting rather than being distracted. This stilling of the mind has many positive effects; both physical and emotional.

After watching this report I realized that as much as I appreciated the story it left me with a feeling of sadness. My sadness is that Mindfulness is the action of the secular world striving to fill a gap that the Church has failed to address in the lives of people. Mindfulness is a secular word for prayerful meditation. Along with Anderson Cooper I agree that most of us live with our minds in a near constant state of distraction and this carries right into how we live out our faith. Prayer often happens while we are in the midst of other things and our prayers are most often a litany of requests for blessing, healing, and help. I confess that often my prayers happen while I am driving down the road or the midst of something else. I fear that we see prayer as the monologue of our lives where we do all the talking and God is supposed to do all the

listening. I hope that we do take the time to listen but I fear that listening is an infrequent discipline.

I believe that prayer is more than talking to God or even listening; prayer is the action of placing ourselves in a state of awareness for the presence of the Lord. As Christians we indeed believe in God's presence in our lives but we are often too distracted to notice. Prayer and meditation are disciplines that allow us to lay aside our distractions and be open to the presence of God. At one time church sanctuaries were left open so that people could come inside to pray and find a quiet sacred space to be aware of the presence of God. Vestiges of these ancient practices of seeking awareness of God's presence exist in our worship practices in both the Sanctuary and Grace Hall. In the order of service in the Sanctuary we have a moment of silence during the musical prelude where we are invited to silence our hearts and minds in preparation for worship. In Grace Hall we have 'Praise Reports' that are meant to be a time of witnessing to each other as to where we have had breakthrough moments when we have become aware of God's presence in our lives. Sadly in both settings we often forget the purpose of these elements of our worship; the prelude is often a time for whispered greetings or putting a few more items on a post worship shopping list (or in my case; a last minute tweak of the sermon) and Praise Reports become an opportunity for additional announcements.

God is in our world and in our lives but in our distraction we miss the sacred presence that is all around us. Jesus came into the world and here is what the Gospel of Mark had to say: "Jesus went into Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God 'The time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the gospel!" Did you hear that? The Kingdom of God is near! This is the good news that the Son of God came to declare to us and while we claim to believe in Jesus we are too busy and too distracted to embrace that Kingdom of God that is ever near. In prayer and meditation we can learn to be mindful of God's presence. And while secular Mindfulness can help us to be aware of the simplicity of sitting or walking my prayer is that we might become more mindful of the presence of the Lord in our lives and in the world.



In the beginning, God created Earth and gave humankind dominion over it--dominion meaning caring, protection, preservation and stewardship. We know that Earth is being damaged by human activity. The 2014 Living Planet Report, recently released by the World Wildlife Fund, shows the number of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish across the globe has decreased by 50% between 1970 and 2010. Additionally, fossil fuels (coal, oil and natural gas)—non-renewable energy resources—are rapidly being

depleted.


