Temptation High Above Jericho

One of my most vivid memories from my trip to Israel last year was the afternoon that we visited the ancient site of Jericho. It is a community located near the Jordan River on the West Bank. Jericho is one of the oldest documented communities in civilization.

People who know something about the Old Testament readily associate the ancient leader, Joshua, with the city of Jericho because it was under Joshua's leadership that the city of Jericho was



reclaimed by the people of God. Joshua was trained by Moses and when Moses died, Joshua became the leader of Israel. His leadership was faithful to God. It was also a time of bloody violence in the name of Yahweh.

When we visited Jericho, it was late afternoon. We stood at the top of a wall that is being excavated. It may have been the wall that Joshua circled, or it may have been even older. But it certainly brings to mind trumpets blowing as the wall came tumbling down. We read scripture and talked about Jericho. But here is what I remember the most....When you look up from that site you see a mountain which is thought to be the place of Jesus' temptations in the wilderness.

I became fascinated by looking up at that site and thinking about Jesus being in the wilderness with Satan for 40 days and nights. The devil threw at him all of the things that are most near and dear to Jesus and the rest of humanity as well: our physical, emotional, and spiritual well-being. Most of all, Satan tempted him with the opportunity to show power that would draw people to him. But Jesus resisted each of those temptations opting to stay faithful to God and to God's plan of salvation.

Here is what is so fascinating to me. The Wilderness of Jesus' Temptations and the city of ancient Jericho are within eye sight of each other. Jesus resisted claiming his own glory while possibly looking at the site where Joshua had become the mighty leader of Israel.

Jesus and Joshua are the same name, meaning "The Lord saves." Jesus and Joshua were both obedient to God's call. Yet, there was a huge difference in their methods. Joshua led one bloody battle after another. Jesus taught a different way of justice through peace and love for others. Joshua received glory in his lifetime while Jesus died on a cross with no glory.

It seems to me that this demonstrates that God works in a variety of ways (and mysterious ways, to be sure). Certainly today, most Christians strongly favor the way of justice through peace and love taught by Jesus, though we know that sometimes we need to engage in force and take up the battle in order to win a longer lasting peace and justice.

There are many who say the Bible has become irrelevant in our world today. I think that the sharp contrast between Jesus' wilderness and Joshua's conquest of Jericho demonstrate just how relevant the Bible is for us. But we can't take a cursory view of it; we have to go deeper. We need to be willing to grapple with contrasts and challenges in order to hear God's message for us in our own context.

Like Jesus, we all face temptations that involve our physical, emotional, and spiritual well-being. When we look around we see all kinds of options that tempt us to take the easy way out. Instead, I pray that we will seek the higher road, looking for God's guidance even when it isn't easy to figure out.

The Holy Spirit not only led Jesus into the wilderness, but stayed with him through the entire 40 days. Likewise, the Holy Spirit stays with us, helping us to find the right path and guiding us into the way of peace. May we be willing to seek the difficult answers and remain obedient to God's calling whether we are in a time of joy or a time of wilderness.

God on Our Terms

Frank Sinatra, ballad singer of another generation, had a song made popular in the latter part of his life entitled, "I Did it My Way." In many ways this was a theme song of a generation that Tom Brokaw titled, "The Greatest Generation." The lyrics of this song speak to the independent spirit of a people who faced the Great Depression, confronted the horror and suffering of World War II and brought about the great economic boom of the 1950's and 1960's. One of the lasting marks of the Greatest Generation upon the American psyche has been a spirit of individualism. The icons of that generation, Generals Patton and MacArthur, movie legends John Wayne and Kirk Douglas, authors Ernest Hemingway and Jack London all represented this spirit of individualism that continues to mark our American Spirit and weaves a common thread throughout all succeeding generations.

The modern theme of individualism began to take shape in the mid-eighteenth century and found fertile soil in the people of America. While there is much to embrace in the spirit of individualism it has had a profoundly detrimental effect on the Church, as the body of Christ. Moses Mendelssohn, a German thinker, recommended on matters of religion and faith that each person follow what he or she finds most convincing. Institutionally the church pushed back against such thinking with what is now known as the Fundamentalist movement which sought to theologically legislate all matters of life and godly thinking. Sadly this sort of churchly pushback has done more harm than good driving more and more people to consider the church as a collection of closed-minded people who are interested in issues of controlling the lives of others.

The end of the twentieth and the beginning of the twenty-first centuries has been a difficult time for the Christian Church in America and Europe. On Sundays in Europe, most churches are nearly empty. In America more and more churches struggle to stay open as the numbers of those who identify with any congregation or denomination continues to dwindle. It isn't that people have no interest in God or in being a part of a faith community; the difficulty is that they seek after a God that will meet the terms of what they personally believe to be important. There is a whole swath of people in the youngest generations who are intensely spiritual yet wander from one church or group to the next. Sociologists have labeled them Nomads; those who seem unable or unwilling to set down roots with any particular congregation or belief system.

This spirit of individualism has become a hammer that continually batters the life of congregations. Always there exists the threat of every member, spoken or unspoken, "agree with me or I will leave." The complication of course becomes that when everybody has differing or even conflicting beliefs/opinions, the leadership of churches find themselves in the tenuous place of "Damned if you do... Damned if you don't do." People leave if: the music is too loud or too soft; too traditional or too contemporary; the pastors too liberal or too conservative; the building too old or too new; they let "those people" in or they exclude "those people," etc. etc. etc. The spirit of individualism has the horrible consequence of fracturing and shattering community; the Church, social structure and family. The current collapse of so much of our society, in my estimation is the result of radical individualism.

Since ancient times one of the marks of human development has been our ability to live in community. Last year I stood at the archeological site of the oldest known city, Jericho, where they have uncovered the oldest known wall ever built by human beings for mutual protection. Civilization arose when people came to understand the power of being together rather than apart. The descendants of Abraham and Sarah also came to understand the importance of a relationship with God. The history of the Bible, both Old and New Testament, is a collection of the writings of people coming to understand what it means to be in relationship with God and each other. What is discovered is that we find the meaning of who we are when we see ourselves as members of the family of God.

In that song, made famous by Frank Sinatra, there are these haunting lyrics,

For what is a man, what has he got?

If not himself, then he has not

To say the things he truly feels

And not the words of one who kneels

I doubt it was the intent of the song writer to reject the faith of those who kneel. But radical individualism indeed becomes a rejection of those who seek to embrace faith in God that has been revealed by prophets and apostles.

The Church, the Body of Christ, is the gathering of people who seek to understand themselves in the context of God's Family.

The Christian faith is not about seeking a God who meets our terms. Rather the journey of faith is coming to a place of embracing God on God's terms. And Jesus said it best; 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' (Mark 12:29-31) The Church is about coming together to love God, to love our neighbor and to receive the blessing of being loved.

The radical nature of Divine love is contrary to radical individualism of our day. Perhaps a part of the reason that so many shy away from the Church is that the radical nature of God's love indeed calls us to set aside our radical (sinful) self for something greater and life-giving. Since the time of Abraham and Sarah, from the time that Jesus and his disciples walked the face of the earth, the message of Divine love has been about reshaping human beings into something more than just being individuals and rather to see ourselves as Children of God.

At Grace Lutheran Church we declare in our Mission Statement that we are a people who are about "Building Relationships with God and Community." We seek to live out God's love as it has been revealed to us in Jesus Christ.

The CROP Walk will be held on Sunday, April 19, with registration beginning at 1:30 p.m. and the send-off at 2:00 p.m. Walkers from area churches will gather at St. Paul's United Methodist Church, 200 High Street, New Windsor, MD 21776 for the start and finish of the 5-mile out-and-back walk on Rt. 75.

The purpose of the walk is to raise awareness of hunger and to raise money for relief abroad through Church World Service (CWS). By now Lent has started and many of you are thinking about what Lent means to a child of God.

It seems like you just celebrated Christ's birth and now you've started preparations for his death. Can someone explain this to me? I can tell things about hunger and how to help but this one makes me scratch my shell. I think I'll check with the "Professor," you may remember Mr. Owl from a warmer time several months ago.

In the meantime, since one of us mentioned being hungry, I have some new facts for you. One in four or five people in the world suffers from extreme hunger. Also, it has been proven that undernourished children suffer not only in physical ways such as height and weight but, their learning skills suffer as well. You might think the USA is alone in this feeding task, but it isn't. Fifty other countries work together to assist those other populations that have this food shortage problem. One neat thing I just learned is about how ELCA workers have taken a pond area, planted fruit trees around it, stocked the pond with fish, added bee hives and used the pond water, with the fish water and its by-products, to water their other plants while the bees pollinate the trees and other plantings. I just can't wait to get out and sit on a warm rock and sun myself. Hurry spring, please.



Two weeks of Bad Weather has Created a \$28,000 Shortfall

Cold weather and snow on the weekends of February 14-15 and 21-22 have created a huge income deficit of \$28,000 in these two weeks.
