Learning to Partner with the World

In the course of my daily reading I stumbled upon this wonderful quote by Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, "Science takes things apart to see how they work. Religion puts things together to see what they mean." In our current age and culture there is for many a perceived notion of conflict between science and religion. Since the mid-nineteenth century the Christian Church in general has spent a significant segment of energy in confronting science. In the early twenty-first century it would appear that this battle has been largely lost as many young people are now growing up partially and totally disconnected from Church. The most recent generations of our age have grown up with a pervasive thought that religion is an anti-intellectual institution. In large part I believe that this disengagement from faith/religion is the result of a vocal part of the church expressing its fear of science. A majority within the faith who are uncertain as to the relationship between faith and science remain silent. Those who do not see any conflict are apparently unable to effectively communicate this position. The result of this form of engagement between science and religion is that most people think they must choose a side. I believe this to be an unnecessary action that in the end helps no one. I believe Rabbi Sacks' quote helps reframe the intersection of faith/religion and science in a much more useful fashion.

The dramatic rise of technology and its profound influence in our world is the result of engineers and great thinkers taking the discoveries of science and translating them into a (hopefully) useful purpose for the benefit of society. In the great advancements of science and technology too often to the world religion has been seen as silent or as merely opposed to much that is taking place. Sadly when religion does engage in the topic of what all these discoveries mean the cry too often heard is a profound negativity often the result of reactionary thinking. There is a grand historical moment that can serve as an example to us; in 1610 Galileo discovered and published findings that Earth and the planets revolve around the Sun. In our day that doesn't sound like much, but in a reactionary moment the Church responded blindly. "The Roman Inquisition tried Galileo in 1633 and found him 'gravely suspect of heresy', sentencing him to indefinite imprisonment. Galileo was kept under house arrest until his death in 1642." (Galileo Affair - Wikipedia) The Church worried that the discoveries of Galileo were somehow opposed to God when in truth this great scientist merely discovered and offered a clearer picture of how God had indeed created the heavens and the earth.

I fear that at times people of faith are no less reactionary than when the church so foolishly considered Galileo a potential heretic. I believe that our task is to understand our world and put the pieces together and begin to try and make sense of what it all means. Presently it seems as if Quantum and Astro Physicists are the ones who are trying to bring

meaning to things discovered perhaps in part to the fact that too often religion has abdicated its responsibility in being a part of the dialog. I believe there is much we can bring to the table in trying to understand what all these scientific discoveries mean; how new discoveries can impact our lives.

Beyond the super-intellectualism of where science and religion meet I believe there is also a need for faith to be super-engaged in our daily world helping to bring meaning to the conflicts and confusion of our world. Too long the extreme fringes of religion have set the agenda of conversation. The voice and action of radical Islam has blinded the rest of the world to the true meaning of this great world religion. Radical Judaism is often assumed to be the legitimate voice for all faithful Jews. The leaders of fundamentalist non-denominational mega-churches have become the spokespersons for American Christianity. The terrifying consequence of this movement within each of these three Abrahamic faiths is that gifts we can bring to the world are superseded by what is often venomous ideas that are a corruption of what are the good and great teachings of each of these traditions. In a world that is in the midst of radical transition people of faith must be willing to speak up and join into mutual conversations with each other and the world.

In this season of Easter the Christian community has a profound message of hope that the confusion and perceived darkness of this present age need not have the last word. The darkness of Good Friday is overwhelmed by the light of Easter. This is a message we bring to all the world that can allow us to speak with hope to people of all faith and intellectual traditions. We need not meet days with fear, but rather seek to bring useful and hopeful dialog in all that is before us.

What we must all remember is that it is not for a chosen few to be involved in such dialog, but for all of us who celebrate the resurrection to engage our particular place in life in the good news. We need not be fearful of science, technology, politics or world events. However we must all learn to become fully engaged with the goal of listening to the knowledge and perspectives of others and in turn share our good news of Jesus and his revelation to the world of a loving God; so that together we may find meaning that will guide us all to a better world. Is this possible? Of course it is! Remember we are the people who know that there is indeed a resurrection.

We want to be sure that everyone understands that our salvation comes purely from the goodness of God through Jesus. Even good people can't do enough good works to make up for the broken relationship with God caused by sin.

Yet, good works are clearly part of the Christian life; we just have to be sure that we get them in the right order and understand their purpose. Speaking of Jesus, the book of Titus says, "He it is who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify for himself a people of his own who are zealous for good deeds." (Titus 2:14)

As we come to the close of another Lenten season, I am reminded once again of the large number of people here at Grace who come forward to do good deeds. During Lent, I especially see those who participate in the many, many roles of worship leadership: choirs and other musical groups, acolytes, communion servers, worship assistants, readers, ushers, and altar guild are a few examples. During our midweek services this year, Liz Meuse-Cummiskey chanted Evening Prayer each Wednesday evening, providing a beautiful service in which we

could all participate. Many people participated in a "Readers Theater" that helped us reflect on the words Jesus spoke from the cross. Jan Mickey, Ron Fairchild, Bob Lichtfuss, Kay Betz, and Dave Cox came forward to share pieces of their faith journeys with us so that we could all reflect on our own growth in faith. Many of those who worshiped on Wednesday evenings have shared a written reflection of their own faith which you can read on the bulletin board outside of the kitchen. This year nearly 40 people provided a YouTube devotion to enrich our Lenten observance.

Of course, good works often revolve around food here at Grace! During Lent we add the midweek soup meals. I lost count at how many people participated in providing and serving the soup, breads and desserts that were enjoyed each week. And those extra meals don't stop us from serving lunch and dinner to the community each and every week. Table of Grace and Ardent Folk continue to reach out to our neighbors with the love of Christ all year long.

Good works keep our congregation alive and active; but good works don't stop here. We are called to serve our Lord each and every day wherever we are....how we treat the people in

our families, the ways in which we do our daily work, the use of our time when we are away from work, the support we give to the church and other human causes are examples of the way in which Jesus' forms and transforms our lives. All of these good works, large and small, honor the One who gave His life that we might have life abundantly now and forever. When we serve the body of Christ internally and when we act as the body of Christ in the world, our good deeds are important.

I want to say "thank you" to all of you who contribute to the quality and the quantity of ministry here at Grace. Whether your role was noticed by everyone, or was done quietly when no one else was around, you did a good thing! Thank you.

I also want to say "thank you" to each and every person who lives out your faith Monday-Saturday outside of the church building. Carrying out the mission of Christ in the secular world is not easy, but that is after all what we are all about.

Next month, we will have a listing of people who provided leadership for our Lenten worship and devotional opportunities. But for now, I wanted to say thank you on behalf of the entire congregation. I hope we all remember what an important role these good works play in responding to Jesus who gave Himself for us.


Honoring Arthur Pease




Least of These Ministries Mission Trip
