# **Appreciating God's Creation**

As we enjoy the return of warmth and color to our world, I wanted to share with you a Bible Study that I wrote. I had the opportunity to present this Bible Study to the people who gathered recently for Food and Faith. I hope you will take time to read the Bible passages, along with my comments. Let us give thanks for this wonderful world and for God's trust in us to be caretakers of creation.

## Read: Genesis 1:26 - 2:1

The Bible describes the beginning of human life taking place in a garden. When man and woman were lovingly created by God, they came alive in a place already filled with plants, trees, fish and wild life. The humans were given dominion over the rest of creation.

Then they set out on a journey to figure out what that meant!

Dominion, at first glance, means power. But the humans needed to learn how to turn power into stewardship. The responsibility of dominion was for the care of the earth, not simply the comfort of the people. Learning to become caretakers would help the people learn what it means to be created in God's image.

## Read: Exodus 16:2 & 3; 9-12

So much of the story of God's chosen people can be described as a journey. While on this journey the people passed through lush, fertile places and they dwelt in the desert for long periods of time.

What did they learn from the journey? Well, many things...but a major piece of it was that they learned to trust in God. As it turns out, these people, who had dominion over creation were really dependent upon God for their very lives. Food was often scarce...from those experiences they learned they could not control nature. Left to themselves, they could not produce the very food that they needed. They could best be described as "dependent caretakers."

## Read: Luke 12:13 – 21

Jesus told a wonderful parable about a rich fool who had more than enough to eat and more possessions then he could store. He built bigger barns to no avail. That night he had to face his creator. What good was it that he had so much on earth?

Dominion...being a caretaker...means acknowledging our dependence upon God. It means sharing whatever we have with others. The only value in a plentiful harvest is that it will feed many!

#### Read: Luke 24:28 - 35 and John 21:9 - 13

Finally, let us remember that the risen Jesus revealed himself on that first Easter night in a home in the village of Emmaus when he broke the bread. Later, he revealed himself to his disciples on the shore of the Sea of Tiberius where he built a charcoal fire to grill the fish. Jesus himself joined his disciples in a meal of bread and fish as they spoke of love and the mission to be shepherds of God's creation.

From dominion to stewardship...

From caretakers to shepherds...

This is the journey of God's people in the Bible and it is our journey as well.

God provides a wonderful array of grain, vegetables, fruits, nuts, fish and meat for us. These precious gifts are not there for us to become gluttons or rich fools. These gifts of creation are for us, yes; but more importantly, they are for us to share.

"Feed my sheep," Jesus told Peter. It is Jesus' charge to us as well!

## Hanlon's Razor

"Never attribute to malice what can be explained by ignorance." This little piece of wisdom is referred to as "Hanlon's Razor." I stumbled upon this statement some weeks ago and it has become an insightful lens for examining the ever increasing negative rhetoric and assumptions being put forth by people on every side of the political, social and religious spectrum. We hear or see something that differs from our particular perspective and our reaction is to assume the worst. I suppose that it is human nature to begin from a place of a negative reaction. What is troubling is that we seldom do anything to test our assumptions. Instead of engaging ourselves in an exploration of that which is different we gather together supporting evidence that defends our particular assumptions or perspectives.

In our current age with access to the Internet and social media it is exceedingly easy to gather together all who would agree with what we want to believe. The consequence of this unreflective approach to what is different is that we end up blindly justifying our particular perspective and striking out against what we have come to assume to be wrong or bad or evil. Liberals consider conservatives to be evil and mean spirited; conservatives consider liberals to be engaged in robbing people of their freedoms. Now take that example and apply it to any of the hot button issues of our day and you find the verbal slings and arrows of polarizing rhetoric that are crippling our ability to speak to or hear each other. We assume then that those opposed to our point of view are not just wrong but somehow evil and are intent on somehow wishing us harm.

Sadly we have reached a place in our world where we are in desperate need of perspective. But which perspective do we choose? Republican? Democrat? Libertarian? Veteran? Civilian? Christian? Muslim? Jew? Atheist? Clergy? Laity? There are a thousand different perspectives from which we can survey the world around us, but which place will afford us the best place from which to find our way out of the confusion of the day? I would caution that any position that doesn't allow you the freedom to openly hear or see differing perspectives is perhaps not a useful place to be. Any position that results in you issuing or embracing venomous threats toward others, no matter how justifiable it may seem, is perhaps a faulty place from which to see anything. Any place that suggests that it is okay to dismissively look down at others as simpletons or fools is not useful either.

I offer the perspective of Golgotha; the place of the cross. This high perspective is where Jesus met all who ignorantly opposed him and his ministry. Here was the moment when people who should have known better struck out with exceeding violence because Jesus was teaching and acting in ways they did not understand. Golgotha is where they tortured and killed Jesus and in the midst of such horror Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34) It would seem that Jesus did not attribute malice to their ignorance. The Christian perspective always begins from a place of assumed love for all people even those who may see the world differently than we do. Christian love is that place where we earnestly seek to hear, see and understand people.

The difficult part of Christian love is learning to approach the world not with clenched fists but with open loving arms. Our world is exceedingly wounded and festering with hate and misunderstanding. Blind perspectives that will not allow us to hear and see the hopes, the fears and needs of others must be laid aside. It is time for us to be the Church, the body of Christ that meets the darkness of our day with the light of Christ. We must meet the ignorance of the world with the truth of God's reconciling love which was revealed from the heights of Golgotha.

## God's Work. Our Hands. Our Voices.

There are many effective ways to do God's work, especially if we want to have an impact on reducing hunger throughout the world. The third part of this article's title: "Our Voices" is all about advocacy. While organizing food drives is one of the most popular things to do, it is also the least effective form of advocacy to impact hunger. In contrast, the most effective way is to contact our elected officials. And yet, simply contacting our elected officials won't get us very far if we haven't first connected with people who are experiencing hunger on a daily basis.

For this, I commend so many people at Grace Lutheran Church. Grace has already taken the first step, to open your doors and invite people in for free community meals. This provides such a powerful and beautiful opportunity for you to get to know the people on the margins of your county. Through this opportunity, you can hear their stories, care for them, and then through the power of your care and personal interactions, use your position to advocate for them on county, state, and federal government levels.

Since many of you have already begun taking the first step into the realm of God's work which we are called to in our baptism, here are some suggestions of how to take the second (and sometimes scary) third step.

- **Build relationships** with one another, lawmakers, and media. This develops trust which is what makes advocacy work effectively.
- Communicate go visit elected officials and write them letters and emails, write to newspaper editors, agree to do
  interviews or testify to friends, attend town hall meetings, be vocal on social media, attend rallies, or show up at press
  conferences.
- Invite create opportunities for policymakers and media to see what you see.
- Accompany be present so others can tell their stories in a safe place, and honor that safety, asking permission before sharing their stories.
- Vote policies to lift up those who experience hunger, cannot be changed or made without your input through voting.

Isaiah 31:8-9 (NET) says "Open your mouth on behalf of those unable to speak, for the legal rights of all the dying. Open your mouth, judge in righteousness, and plead the cause of the poor and needy." Grace and the ELCA have done a fabulous job of being the hands and feet for God, loving our neighbors and helping when and where we are called upon to be. Scripture as well, calls us into action; but this time with our voices, not just our hands, to do the work of God. If we open our mouths together, to advocate for those experiencing poverty and hunger, God's glory will shine forth in those who are suffering. God's blessings to you all in your continued ministry!

Given Marty's note below, I would also like thank you for continuing to be a part of The Shepherd's Staff ministry. It is humbling to know that we are working as your hands in our community and we could not do what we do without support like this. Our numbers are increasing exponentially on an almost daily basis, and the reason behind the increase is changing. We have gone from serving 3,045 households in 2012 to 5,842 households in 2015 and we have chosen to do this without Federal, State or County funding. This allows us to be a witness for Christ in our community. We strive not to duplicate services and focus on those that are unable to receive services elsewhere, those that fall between the cracks; our working poor, our seniors and youth between the ages of 18-24.
